Behind the bench: M. Randall Jurrens on the ‘tip of the iceberg’ of a judge’s role

SAGINAW, MI — A judge since 2002, M. Randall Jurrens is accustomed to the many roles his position entails. He evaluates evidence during preliminary examinations in criminal cases, sentences drunken drivers, and presides over business matters, landlord-tenant disputes, and various civil disagreements.

Jurrens is Saginaw County’s second longest-serving District Court judge, behind only [Terry L. Clark](#). He’s cultivated traits beneficial to any jurist: Soft-spoken and deliberate, he has an impassive, hard-to-read countenance when listening to witnesses testify before him. If you’ve appeared before him, you may have been on the edge of your seat before he delivered his ruling, not knowing which way the arguments swayed him.

Today, Jurrens is the focus of the fourth installment in MLive/The Saginaw News’ ongoing “Behind the Bench” series.

Q: What inspired you to pursue a career in the law?

A: From my earliest days – perhaps as early as kindergarten – I was attracted to the concept of being a lawyer. My interest in history during primary and secondary school – including learning that many of our nation’s founding fathers were lawyers – reinforced that early inclination. Then, a focus on government in college, and a couple of summers working in state government, solidified the conclusion that my future lay in the law.

Q: What’s the most rewarding aspect of being a judge?

A: Resolving cases not only by proper application of the law, but by articulating the decision in a way not just the attorneys but, importantly, the parties themselves can understand (if not embrace).

Q: What's the most challenging aspect of being a judge?

A: Lawyers and litigants who “blow smoke.” I love a well-prepared, well-presented, well-argued case. Establishing relevant facts and properly applying relevant law is what drives justice. It's a beautiful thing when done right. For some, however, wanting to win at any cost clouds their judgment, frustrates these basic principles, and challenges my expectations.

Q: What advice would you give to your younger self when you first assumed the bench?

A: Be ever vigilant to maintain the ideals that motivated me to pursue the role, and responsibility, of a judge.

Q: What's a common misconception the public has regarding your role?

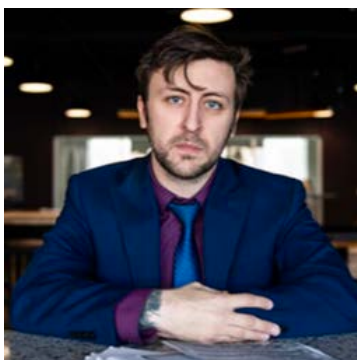
A: I fear many people think the job is just casually sitting through trials, making a few random evidentiary rulings, and effortlessly rendering verbal decisions from the bench. It is so much more. Reading the daily stream of new appellate court decisions and newly enacted legislation that are constantly changing the legal landscape, studying the unending flow of pretrial motions and briefs, spending countless hours researching and writing opinions, performing a myriad of administrative duties, etc. What people see in court is the tip of a very large iceberg.

Q: What's your favorite legal novel, movie, and/or TV series and why?

A: So many to choose from. I recall watching “Perry Mason” as a young child and was impressed with his extraordinary legal skills. Now, decades later, I still regularly watch re-runs. Favorite legal novels include “Anatomy of a Murder” and “To Kill a Mockingbird.” Both books are on my office shelf and I've seen the film versions multiple times.

Q: Is there anything else you'd like the public to know?

A: I have a truly lovely, patient and supportive wife!



**Saginaw County Road Commission
honored with five statewide IMPRESS Awards!**

LANSING, MI – The Saginaw County Road Commission (SCRC) was honored with five statewide IMPRESS Awards at the 2026 County Road Association (CRA) of Michigan Highway Conference held in late March in Lansing. IMPRESS Awards recognize county road agencies that demonstrate innovation on noteworthy projects in the categories of communication, operations and collaboration.

This year, Saginaw County received IMPRESS Awards in:

- **COLLABORATION** for its *“Six-Year Road Millage.”* SCRC partnered with its 27 townships to develop coordinated road plans and establish township road committees following voter approval of a six-year road millage in 2024. This entry also received a **People’s Choice Award**, determined by a popular vote of the 1,000 conference attendees.
- **COMMUNICATIONS** for its *“Bi-Annual Company Newsletter.”* The newsletter shares timely updates, highlights staff and projects and strengthens communication with both employees and the public.
- **OPERATIONS** for its salt barn facilities. SCRC enhanced winter operations by constructing two high-capacity salt barns in strategic locations to improve storage capacity and operational efficiency. This entry also received a People’s Choice Award.

“Saginaw County’s success across multiple categories reflects a strong, well-rounded approach to serving its communities,” said Denise Donohue, CRA CEO. “From building partnerships and communicating effectively to making smart operational investments, these efforts demonstrate how agencies can deliver meaningful results on every front.”

An independent panel of communications and operations experts from several of Michigan’s 83 county road agencies judged all IMPRESS Awards submissions. Award recipients were honored for projects that solved time constraints, labor costs, communication barriers and fostered collaboration.

The 83 members of the County Road Association of Michigan represent the unified voice for a safe and efficient county transportation infrastructure system in Michigan, including appropriate stewardship of the public’s right-of-way in rural and urban Michigan. Collectively, Michigan’s county road agencies manage 75% of all roads in the state, including 90,500 miles of roads and 5,900 bridges. County road agencies also maintain the state’s highway system in 63 counties. Michigan has the nation’s fourth-largest local road system.

You probably use your favorite search engine, such as Google or Bing, to find more information about topics that interest you. Have you ever stopped to think about how the top search results earned their spots? Unfortunately, cybercriminals can use search engine results to launch cyberattacks.

What Is SEO and How Does It Affect You?

SEO is the process of improving a website to rank higher in search results. High-ranked websites and pages receive more visibility, producing invaluable clicks and views. After all, when is the last time you actually made it to page two or three of your search results? If a website is behind two or three pages of search results, you probably won't see it. Most people settle for an answer on page one, even if that answer comes from an unfamiliar source.

How Do Cybercriminals Use SEO to Target You in Search Results?

Cybercriminals use SEO to boost the ranking of their malicious websites, giving them the appearance of legitimacy. You may find the information you were looking for on the first page of your search results and click the link. To gain access to the full information, the website may prompt you to create an account, sign up for a mailing list, or enter other personal information. Even if these websites seem safe, your information could fall right into the cybercriminals' hands.

Another way that cybercriminals use SEO in their attacks is by targeting high-ranking websites. Cybercriminals will work to get a foothold in established websites by targeting employees with cyberattacks, such as phishing emails. If an employee falls prey to a cyberattack and provides login credentials or other personal information, the cybercriminals can use that information to gain entry into the website. From there, cybercriminals can plant links that redirect visitors to their own malicious websites. You may click a link from a legitimate, high-ranking website and find yourself on a different website instead.

What Can I Do to Stay Safe?

You don't need to stop using search engines, but you do need to stay vigilant. Follow the tips below to protect yourself and your organization from these types of scams:

- Always think before you click on a link to a website. Can you get the information you need without accessing the website, such as in the snippet preview text? If the website seems suspicious, is there a legitimate website you could visit instead?
- If you visit an unknown website, don't enter sensitive information such as login credentials or personal data. Leave the website and attempt to find the information through secure, legitimate sources.

Check the URL you are visiting. Is the URL the same link you clicked on from the search results, or were you redirected to another page?

Mosquito Abatement

Why Adult Control?

Even the most rigorous larviciding program may not be able to keep adult mosquito populations at acceptable levels.

For instance, Saginaw County has a species of mosquito which is very difficult to control in its aquatic stages; larvae of the cattail marsh mosquito *Coquillettidia perturbans* attach to aquatic plant roots to obtain oxygen.

Another factor is Saginaw County has State and Federal Wildlife lands located in the center of the County which are not accessible to larviciding during the summer.



ULV Application

Each ULV unit is carefully calibrated monthly to dispense only 0.05 ounces of active ingredient per acre. In order to be effective against mosquitoes it is important for these machines to break down insecticides into proper droplet sizes, which is 12-25 microns.

Insecticides that the Commission utilizes are a contact spray. This means a certain number of droplets must come into contact with the mosquito in order for it to be absorbed into its body resulting in mortality. Monthly tests are conducted to determine the mass median diameter (MMD) droplet size of the ULV equipment. MMD is defined as the diameter of the drop which divides the spray volume into 2 equal parts. Fifty percent of the volume of droplets are below the MMD and 50% are above. MMD's are also completed on all repaired ULV equipment before it is returned to service. By determining the MMD's, the biology staff knows if the equipment is producing droplets within the optimal range, and meeting adulticide label requirements.

ULV applications are less effective at temperatures below 56 degrees, if winds are greater than 10 mph, or in heavy rain. Due to these factors, ULV operations cannot be performed every evening.

Our principal adulticiding material is a 4% permethrin ULV formulation.

SCCMHA awaiting results of CARF Accreditation survey

Saginaw County Community Mental Health Authority (SCCMHA) will participate in a formal accreditation review conducted by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) on April 8–10 and May 20–22. This review evaluates the quality of our services using internationally recognized organizational and programmatic standards.



CARF is an independent, nonprofit accrediting body dedicated to promoting quality, value, and optimal outcomes in health and human services. Established in 1966 as the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities, CARF develops consumer-focused standards that help organizations assess and enhance the effectiveness of their programs and services.

SCCMHA anticipates receiving the results of this accreditation review later in 2026.

SCCMHA hires Hispanic Bilingual Outreach Worker

SCCMHA wants to make sure all communities are reached and represented, including our Hispanic population in Saginaw County.

To help with that, SCCMHA currently employs a Hispanic Bilingual Outreach Worker, who engages with individuals in the community and guides them through services within the agency.

The Hispanic Bilingual Outreach Worker will go into the community to help with coordinating, collaborating and advocating for individuals in the Hispanic community to receive services by meeting people where they are.

In addition, by being able to interface with people directly, the Hispanic Bilingual Outreach Worker will be able to complete an eligibility screen to determine what kind of services an individual might be best qualified to receive and support them through the Access and Intake process to begin receiving services.



It also gives individuals someone they can reach out to if they have any questions about the process or any mental health services.

The Hispanic Bilingual Outreach Worker at SCCMHA is Marilu Bueno, a graduate of Kalamazoo College with a bachelor's degree in psychology. She previously worked as the Family Guide Representative with SCCMHA before transitioning into her current role.

Originally from Illinois and fluent in both English and Spanish, Marilu seeks to connect with the Hispanic community and let them know that she is available to help them with whatever they need for mental health services.

“I think it’s important for people in the community to engage in something as valuable as mental health, because there’s a lot of stigma in our community,” Marilu said. “I’m hoping to help dismantle those stigmas, and I think being able to talk with someone with a similar background makes it much easier for them to reach out and connect with those resources.”

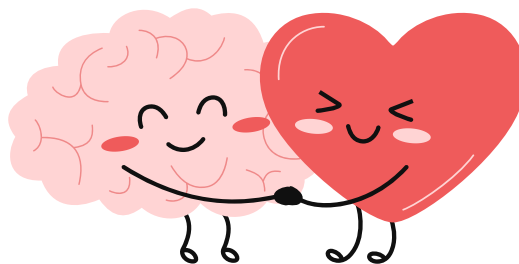
BWell, SCCMHA and other partners roll out Mental Health Directory

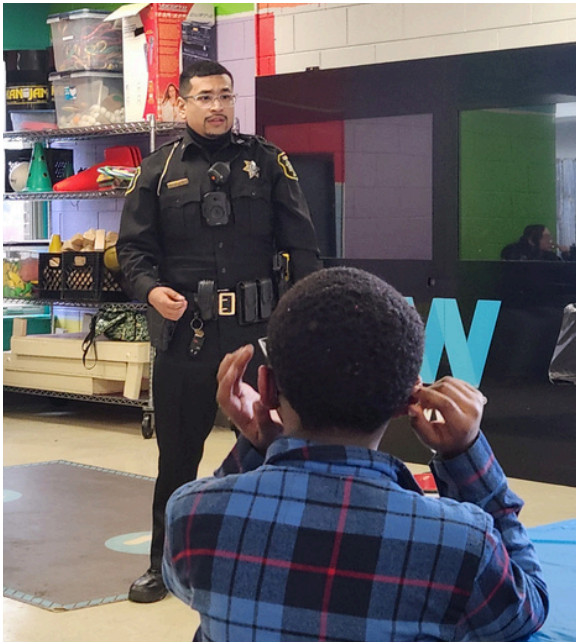

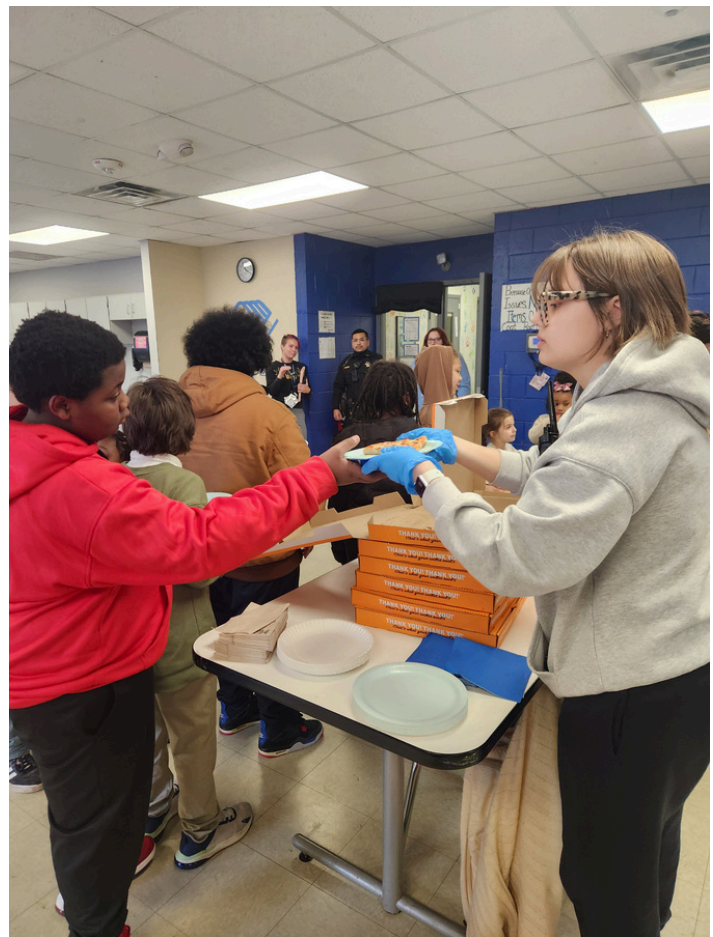




Undersheriff Gomez first met Rebecca at the Boys & Girls Club Night to Remember Gala, where he offered the Sheriff's Office assistance if needed.
